
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DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Novato Police Department serves a community of more than 54,000 residents spanning an area of 28 square miles. The Department is organized into two Divisions: Operations and Services. The Operations Division consists of Patrol Bureau, Investigation Section, and Traffic Section. The Services Division consists of Professional Standards & Training Bureau, Records Section, and Communications Section. The Department employs 60 sworn officers and 21 professional staff who provide essential services such as Records, Training, Property & Evidence, and Administrative Support. There are also 11 citizen volunteers, four Police Interns, and four Police Chaplains.





Message from

Interim Chief of Police Joseph M. Kreins



It is our honor to present to you the 2016 Annual Report for the Novato Police Department. It was my privilege to serve you, the community, as your interim Chief and lead the men and women of the Novato Police Department. This report provides a "snapshot" of the on-going efforts and dedication that the staff of the Novato Police Department provides to our community on a daily basis.

In 2016, we saw a 7% reduction in our violent crime and an overall 1% reduction in all crimes. The decline in crime in our City is due to the diligent, outstanding work by our staff on a daily basis, and our community's willingness to get involved and

keep us informed when they witness crimes. It is a partnership for success. This will be even more critical with the recent law changes in Proposition 47, which reduced many crimes from felonies to misdemeanors.

Our Traffic Section continues to demonstrate that we can reduce traffic collisions not only through enforcement, but also through education and engineering. We were honored to be selected as award recipients in both the California Law Enforcement Challenge and the National Law Enforcement Challenge. The selection as the recipient of the CHP Commissioner's Award for the best overall Traffic Safety Program in the State of California was truly honorable and humbling for our Department.

We continue to invest in technology to promote safety within our community. In 2016, we deployed body cameras to all of our uniformed officers and investigators. I am confident that this tool will increase the trust and confidence that our community has in our Department. Our automatic license plate readers (ALPR) scanned over 1,204,854 license plates in 2016, resulting in a number of arrests and recovery of stolen vehicles.

We look forward to continued success through our philosophy of, and dedication to, community policing.






Arrest Level Beakdown








AWARDS

California Law Enforcement Challenge (CLEC)

The California Law Enforcement Challenge, modeled after the International Association of Chiefs of Police National Law Enforcement Challenge, is a competition between similar-sized and type of law enforcement agencies for the best traffic safety programs in California and focuses on an agency's efforts in occupant protection, impaired driving, and speed awareness, as well as a traffic safety issue unique to the submitting agency's jurisdiction. The program allows law enforcement agencies to: set comprehensive goals, strive to reach new heights in traffic safety, share their experiences with others, and be recognized for their traffic safety accomplishments. Below Officer Tyler Cantley and Sergeant Nick Frey accepted awards for having won third in the state for best overall traffic safety program for our size agency. The Department also won first place in the Special Award category of Occupant Protection for our agency's size. This is the second time in a row the Novato Police Department won this award.

AWARDS

National Law Enforcement Challenge (NLEC)



The National Law Enforcement Challenge (NLEC) is a traffic safety recognition program supported by a cooperative agreement between the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). The NLEC focuses on the traffic safety issues of impaired driving, occupant protection, and speed awareness. Participating agencies are evaluated and awarded points on their approaches to addressing traffic safety issues based on identifying the problem, policies, training, education, enforcement, and results.







Department Grants

FEDERAL GRANTS

Bullet Resistant Vests

The Bullet Resistant Vest grants allow the Department to purchase bullet-resistant armor vests for our police officers thereby improving officer safety.

Justice Assistance Grants

The JAG grants supports educational and recreational programs for the youth of Novato where officers participate in a leadership capacity and interact with participants.

STATE GRANTS

California Option for Public Safety (COPS)

This state grant funds front line law enforcement capital and technology related equipment, supports specialized training for sworn personnel and is used to leverage future grants.

Northern California Computer Crimes Task Force (NC3TF)

One Novato officer is assigned to this multi-agency task force created to investigate computer related crimes, including child pornography, embezzlement, identity theft and money laundering.

Urban Shield Strategy Initiative

Homeland Security grants have funded technology related equipment purchases, including a 4-camera Automatic License Plate Recognition system (ALPR), a RADAR trailer, rescue/throw phone and a remote control robot and Special Response Team Training.

Pedestrian Safety

This grant was part of the state's program to reduce the number of individuals injured or killed in pedestrian collisions.

Department Grants Continued

CALIFORNIA OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY GRANTS

Avoid the Marin 13

This is a county-wide grant that funds enforcement activities to reduce alcohol related fatal and injury traffic collisions in Marin County through DUI checkpoints and saturation patrols.

Sobriety Checkpoint

The Sobriety Checkpoint grants support efforts to reduce the number of victims killed and injured in alcohol-involved collisions. Sobriety checkpoints are an effective way to maximize the deterrent effect and increase the perception of apprehension of motorists who would operate a vehicle while impaired.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety

This grant allowed the Department to enhance and increase existing efforts of reducing injury and collisions involving bicyclists and pedestrians. The primary focus of the safety program is elementary, middle and high schools students, programs offered: Bicycle rodeos, Education, Community events, and Helmet safety.

Click It or Ticket Seatbelt

This grant maintaines an enforcement presence towards persons who fail to use seat belts during pre-established periods.

Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP)

This grant supports the Department's effort to reduce DUI related traffic collisions that include speed, red light violations and distracted driving enforcement and funds the purchases of specialized traffic equipment.

YOUTH GRANTS

Minor Alcohol Access Prevention

This grant supports the Department's efforts toward reducing Youth Access to Alcohol through increased enforcement activities of local and state alcohol control laws.

Drug Free Communities Grant

Grants received through the Blue Ribbon Coalition provide the Department the opportunity to target Social Host Ordinance violations, through compliance operations, enforcement of underage drinking laws and analysis of data surrounding social Host violations.

COMMUNITY GRANTS

Target Corporation

The Target grants allow the Department a unique opportunity to participate in community public safety events such as the National Night Out, Shop with a Cop, Heroes and Helpers, Coffee with Cops, Safe Holiday events and crime prevention related purchases.

Elks National Foundation

This foundation grant funded the purchase of needed working equipment for the Department's newest K-9 unit, including a canine protective vest, and also supported the Heroes and Helpers community event.


K9 Working Foundation / Vested Interest K-9

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Novato Youth Camp

The Department hosted its annual Youth Camp from June 20-24, 2016 for middle school students. The students learned about patrol operations, canine units, the Special Response Team (SWAT), CSI/evidence processing, traffic enforcement, and dispatch. They learned how to fingerprint evidence, use police radio codes, and how to write a traffic citation. The students had fun and the 23 participants graduated from the camp.






radKIDS

The Department hosted the radKIDS Safety Education Program from June 20–24, 2016. The program was taught by Sergeant Sasha D'Amico and Officer Nelson Orantes. The kids learned to have a plan to stay safe by yelling very loudly "*No!*" and running to safety (i.e. cashier in a store) and telling a safe person about what hurt them or made them feel uncomfortable. Safety and defensive skills were taught and the children got to demonstrate those physical skills learned (hand strikes and kicks) to escape violence (a bully or abductor). They also learned how to seek help (call 911 or tell a safe adult) to end the danger. The children did wonderfully and 22 kids, ages 5-12, graduated from the safety program.

Coffee with the Cops



Coffee with the COPS & Firefighters event was held on February 27th at the Novato Youth Center, 680 Wilson Avenue. This event takes place all over the county and offers an opportunity to strengthen the bond between police departments and the community to help keep cities safer.

Heroes & Helpers



On December 10th, the Novato Police Department partnered with Target of Novato for this year's Heroes & Helpers event. Generous donations from Target, the City of Novato, and the Novato Rotary Club allowed the kids to go shopping with police officers! Many children decided to purchase something special for others and their families this year for the holiday season.



ADDITIONAL DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

Police Explorer Post



Novato Police Department Explorers are young men and women, ages 14-20, who are interested in a career in law enforcement. They meet at the Department on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month. In the past month, explorers assisted with RadKIDS, Youth Camp, DUI checkpoints, decoy operations, and various community events. On August 15th, Novato Police Department recognized three outstanding Explorers: Lieutenant Ashley Explorer Schneider, Explorer Sergeant Ella Anderson, and Explorer Marina Escobar-Vazquez for their dedicated years of service.

Our Explorer Post began in 1969 and remains as the only Police Explorer Post in Marin County. The program's goal is to help young adults choose a career path within law enforcement and challenge them to become responsible citizens. Several Novato Police Department employees, including Sergeant Jim Tross, Sergeant Jennifer Dunlap, and Officer Laura LeDuc, have been Explorers.



Crime Free Multi-Housing

The Novato Crime Free Multi-Housing Program was started in 2014 and is designed to help residents, owners, and managers of rental property keep drugs and other illegal activity off their property. This program is honest, direct, solution oriented, and designed to be easy yet very effective in reducing the incident of crime in rental property. YEAR END REVIEW Traffic Section


The mission of the Traffic Section is to reduce injuries, deaths, and property damage caused by traffic collisions within the community. Preventative patrols, pro-active enforcement, community education, analysis of traffic collision data, investigation of traffic collisions, and active problem solving are used to accomplish this mission.



Novato Police Department was awarded the OTS Step grant 2016/2017. This grant provided \$70,000 for 29 operations, two of which were checkpoints conducted from October 1, 2016 through September 30, 2017. The Department as a whole investigated 431 collisions and made 241 DUI arrests. Of the collision, 123 resulted in injuries and 51 were DUI related.

The Department purchased the following with the grant monies: Car counter to help capture the number of vehicles and traffic volumes to better deploy resources for traffic enforcement; 28 cones for sobriety and driver's license check points, and 12 power flares.

YEAR END REVIEW Investigation Section



The Investigations Section works collaboratively with the Patrol Bureau to identify and arrest individuals involved in criminal activity and produce thorough and complete investigative reports that will support prosecutorial efforts. The Investigations Section consists of four detectives and a detective sergeant. Three additional detectives, under the indirect supervision of the detective sergeant, are assigned to multi-agency investigative teams to include the Marin County Major Crimes Task Force and Northern California Computer Crimes Task Force.

The Investigations Section investigates a broad spectrum of criminal activity ranging from property crimes, including identify theft, fraud, burglary, and arson, to person crimes, including sexual assault, child physical/sexual abuse, death investigations, and homicide.

The Investigations Section also actively participates in activities including conducting surveillance, authoring and serving search and arrest warrants, and probation and parole searches.

Additionally, Investigations Section personnel are responsible for issuing police permits related to business operations, monitoring and registering habitual offenders, and assisting the Patrol Bureau when the need is apparent or patrol resources are exhausted.

Communication Section


The Novato Police Department's Communications Center is the key link between police officers and the community they serve. The Communication Center provides around-the-clock call answering and radio dispatching to deliver police services to the community. The Center is the primary 9-1-1 public safety answering point for all incorporated areas within the city. In 2016, there were 14,009 9-1-1 calls received and 40,825 calls for service were dispatched.

Records Section

Records personnel pride themselves on providing quality customer service. The services provided to the public by the Records Specialist's include: reproducing documents, releasing vehicles, and providing directions. Additional services include answering questions about crime prevention, locating towed vehicles, instructing the public on obtaining/enforcing court orders, educating the public about pertinent laws, and fielding questions on a wide range of subjects. Records Specialist also research police records, maintaining files and purging obsolete records.
