To develop options for discussion for improvements to North Redwood Boulevard to:


- 1. Improve mobility options for all users,

- 3. Improve aesthetics for the community.


Process

Study Area






Existing Conditions

- Very auto-dominated
- Large, mature median trees
- Few street trees
- Narrow sidewalks
- No separate bicycle lane
- Well-used diagonal parking on east side of Redwood



Opportunities

- Width of the street!
- Cork oaks
- Ability to connect Grant
 Avenue with ROIC
 development to promote walking the two blocks which separate



Utilities

- Electrical Undergrounding: \$12 million
- Gas Main Relocation:\$3.3 million



Project Objectives

Multi-Modal Transportation

- Create a "Complete Street" that serves all transportation modes
- Improve bicycle and pedestrian facilities to accommodate all ages
- Accommodate traffic needs along Redwood Boulevard, including emergency response and evacuation requirements
- Provide adequate on-street parking to supplement adjacent businesses' on-site parking

Project Objectives

Landscape

- Provide sustainable landscaping to improve aesthetics and walkability, add more trees to create canopies and preserve existing heritage trees, including the Cork Oaks
- Install "Green Street" measures, e.g., handling pollutants through advanced stormwater treatment techniques
- Consider creation of a public plaza within the right-of-way for community events and recreational space

Project Objectives

Economic Development

- Improve the appearance and functions of the Boulevard to spur redevelopment along the corridor
- Integrate redevelopment north of Olive Avenue to the Downtown by creating a better walking environment with activity nodes along the way

Existing Conditions

- Very auto-dominated
- Large, mature median trees
- Few street trees
- Narrow sidewalks
- Long pedestrian crossings
- No separate bicycle lane
- Well-used diagonal parking on east side of Redwood

Circulation Opportunities

- Serve demand at safe speeds
- Retain median trees
- Add pleasant street trees
- Provide wide sidewalks
- Shorter/visible crossings
- Provide separated bike facility
- Retain and enhance diagonal parking
