A. CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

E. **GENERAL BUSINESS**

E.1 Stakeholder Analysis and Community Engagement Strategies

Presentation: Accelerating Equitable Climate Action (*PowerPoint attached*)

- Maria Jaramillo-Botero, Co-Director of Latine Services at North Marin Community Services (NMCS) provided an overview of their Latine Program which includes Climate and Disaster Resilience programs, support for 'Newcomers', and the Promotores program (17 volunteers in Novato/San Rafael and four in West Marin).
- NMCS served 10,579 children, adults, and seniors in 2022, with 78% of this cohort identifying as black, indigenous, or a person of color (BIPOC). Estimated racial composition in Novato is 68% white and 32% non-white.
- NMCS received a grant from the Marin Community Foundation (MCF) to accelerate equitable climate action in Novato in partnership with the City of Novato.
- Maria Albuja Pavon, Climate Action Coordinator for NMCS shared highlights from the mid-year report provided to MCF including collaborations and partnerships, education and outreach efforts, and identification of targeted climate actions.
- In late-summer 2022, NMCS conducted a survey at several schools to learn more about community concerns and priorities related to climate. They received 305 responses.
- NMCS has been partnering with the City on outreach around the gas-powered leaf blower ban and is coordinating a community event for the Leafwood Drive community on climate resilience and disaster preparedness on May 6, 2023. Event collaborators include Marin Wildfire Protection Authority (MWPA), Novato Fire, Novato Police Department and the City's Sustainability Program.
- NMCS has been engaged by MWPA to conduct focus groups on wildfire prevention and is looking forward to partnering with the City on community engagement activities related to the climate action plan update.

Presentation: Stakeholder Analysis Tools

- Coordinator Schubeck gave a presentation on stakeholder analysis and mapping (PowerPoint attached).
- In alignment with the duties of the Commission, the Commission's 2022/23 Workplan Goal #4 is to "facilitate community engagement on sustainability and climate-related initiatives". Objective 'a)' of Workplan Goal #4 is to "work with staff to identify community partners and stakeholders (community organizations, faith-based groups, public agencies, community businesses, etc.) and document current level of engagement on sustainability/climate-related initiatives."
- Coordinator Schubeck gave an overview of the rationale for analyzing stakeholders and the value this work can add to the community engagement process. She provided examples of the various types of internal and external stakeholders, as well as a sample mapping tool that can be used to segment stakeholders based on their influence and interest.

Upon a motion of Commissioner Brown and second by Commissioner Blofeld, the Commission voted 6-0-1 to establish a stakeholder analysis and community

engagement ad-hoc committee and appointed Commissioners Brownstone, Tai, and Yalonis to serve on the Committee.

- Commissioners suggested preparing educational materials on building electrification with information about rebates and incentives (BayREN, IRA, etc.) including indicative net costs for electric appliances.


Climate Action Survey results to-date

ATTENTION NOVATO LANDSCAPERS!



Novato City Council has adopted the new leaf blower rules below:

1. GAS-POWERED LEAF BLOWERS

- The use of gas-powered leaf blowers is now banned in Novato, but the ban won't be
 enforced until July 1, 2023, to allow time for landscapers to purchase electric
 equipment. *
- You may be eligible for a rebate from the California Air Resources Board to purchase an electrically powered leaf blower. Visit: <u>CaliforniaCORE.org</u> for information.

2. HOURS OF OPERATION FOR LEAF BLOWERS

Leaf blowers can **only** be used during the times below:

- Mon. to Fri.: 8:00 am to 6:00 p.m.
- Sat., Sun., and Holidays: 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

3. REMOVAL OF DEBRIS

All leaves, dirt, and debris must be removed from the job site and cannot be blown onto neighboring public or private property, storm drain systems, or the public right-of-way.


